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Preface

The IS-488 is a plug-compatible workstation, interchangeable with the IBM 3488 terminal. This workstation is directly attached using Twinax cable, to IBM SYS/3X, AS/400 or 5294/5394 Communication Controllers.

This manual provides detailed instructions for installing, configuring and operating the IS-488 Monochrome and LM-488C color workstation.

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1. INTRODUCTION

The Model IS-488/LM-488C workstation is plug compatible and interchangeable with the IBM 3487 and IBM 3488 terminals. The logic box can be connected to any standard color SVGA monitor. The workstation can enable various terminal and printer emulation modes.

It is capable of supporting four displays sessions (two of which can be displayed simultaneously on the screen), and an additional printer session. The printer directly connected to the display station performs as a host printer.

Alice's Paperless Desk is an application that is integrated into the workstation and provides convenient on-line office services that save time and desk space. Among the services offered are: telephone directory, calendar, character set table calculator and notepad.

1.1 Configuration

1.2 Capabilities

Session Display Supports up to four sessions, two of which may be displayed either simultaneously (with a vertical or horizontal split), or alternately on a full screen. Only one session may be active at a time.

Address Sharing A single address may be shared by all the display sessions, allowing you to reserve addresses for other displays or printers on the same port.

The LM-488C supports up to 16 colors, that can be chosen from a 64 color palette.

Any one of the palette colors may be assigned to the sessions background, screen border, mouse pointer and ruler.

2. GETTING STARTED

The IS-488 installation is designed to be simple and fast. Follow the instructions given below for selecting a location, unpacking and installing the workstation.

2.1 Selecting A Location

- a. The area should be clean, free from shock and vibrations, extreme temperatures and high humidity.
- b. The workstation should be placed on a flat surface.
- c. The site should include a wall socket, incoming and outgoing Twinax cable (for additional workstations on the line).
- d. Sufficient space should be left at the back of the workstation to allow free access to the connected cables.
- e. The workstation should be connected directly to the wall socket, and not via an extension cable.
- f. Make sure that the power source is +/-10% of rated power (either 115 or 220 VAC) and the frequency is 50/60 Hz +/- 2 Hz.

2.2 Unpacking Instructions

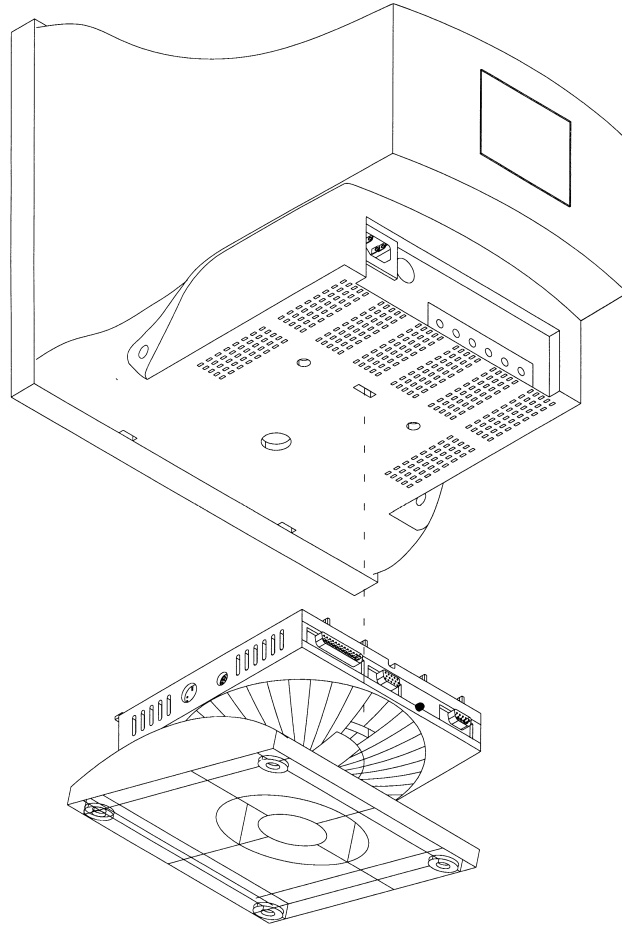
Before opening the shipping package or the protective case, check to make sure that there is no visible external damage. If any such damage was incurred contact your distributor before opening the package.

Make sure that the following items have been included:

1. Keyboard: 122 or 102/103 keyboard
2. PS/2 mouse (option)
3. T-cable
4. Power cord
5. User's Manual
6. **For IS-488 :** Display Monitor and base with integrated Electronic Logic Board
7. **For LM-488C:** Electronic Box.

2.3 Assembling the IS-488 Monochrome Workstation

To setup for the 14-inch monochrome monitor, DSM 1426, perform the following series of steps:



1. Place the monitor upside down on a flat surface.
2. Align the base with the slots in the underside of the and insert the Tilt/Swivel Base into the slots. Refer to the above figure.
3. Pull the Tilt/Swivel Base toward the front of the display until the hook clicks into the slot.

NOTE: To disconnect the base from the monitor, insert a screwdriver into the slot marked with an arrow in the above diagram, and depress the hook towards the front of the monitor.

4. Turn the assembled unit rightside up and connect the cables according to the following illustration:

1. Set the power switch on the monitor to OFF.
2. Face the back of the workstation.
3. Connect the keyboard cable to the keyboard port.
4. If a printer is to be installed, connect the printer cable to the printer port.
5. Connect the mouse (**option**) cable to the mouse port.
6. Connect the monitor interface cable to the monitor connector.
7. Connect the power cable between the rear of the monitor and power outlet.

2.4 Assembling the LM-488C Color Workstation

An LM-488C workstation includes an SVGA color monitor which is assembled according to the manufacturer's instructions.

NOTE: On an LM-488C workstation, the monitor power switch turns on the workstation.

1. Set the power switch to OFF.
2. Face the back of the workstation.
3. Connect the keyboard cable to the keyboard port.
4. If a printer is to be installed, connect the printer cable to the printer port.
5. Connect the mouse (**option**) cable to the mouse port.
6. Connect the monitor interface cable to the monitor connector in the box.
7. Connect the one power cable between the rear of the box and power outlet and the other between the rear of the monitor and the power outlet.

2.5 What to do Next ?

1. Power-ON the workstation.
2. Perform the OFFLINE setup (chapter-3).
3. Power-OFF the workstation and connect the Twinax cable (section 2.6).

2.6 Connecting the Workstation to the Twinax Line

The following steps show how to connect the workstation to the Twinax line:

CAUTION!!!

To avoid electrical shock, turn off the workstation and unplug it from the wall socket before you connect it to the Twinaxial line.

1. Make sure there are no users working on the specific line you are going to connect.
2. Connect the T cable to the appropriate connector on the rear of the workstation. Secure the T cable with two screws.
3. Connect the incoming cable to one of the sockets on the T cable. Connect the outgoing cable (if one exists) to the other socket.
4. If twisted pair cabling is used, then attach an RJ45 connector to the Twinax adapter and attach the adapter to one of the sockets on the T cable. Do not connect an adapter or Twinax cable to the other T-cable socket.

NOTE: The cable is equipped with a built-in terminator. This eliminates the need for a special terminator part for the last terminal on the line.

5. Connect the workstation to the power outlet.
6. Power on the workstation and wait until "SIGN ON SCREEN" appears on the display. If the screen does not appear, refer to Troubleshooting (Chapter-11).
7. Perform the ONLINE setup (chapter-4).

2.7 Workstation Maintenance

Regular cleaning and maintenance procedures are required to keep your workstation in good operating condition. It is recommended to clean the workstation regularly and make use of the screen saving options.

2.7.1 Cleaning the Workstation

Clean the screen surface with a soft, lint-free cloth, dampened with an ammonia or alcohol-based glass cleaner.

Alternatively, use a mild detergent solution in water as a glass cleaner, then wipe with a water-dampened cloth.

ATTENTION!!

Avoid the use of petroleum-based cleaners.

2.7.2 Screen Saver Option

The option is enabled in the Setup display of the Online Setup. Enabling this option prolongs CRT life.

It causes the screen to dim automatically if for a preset time (5 to 20 minutes), no key is pressed or there is no host command input. An indicator will appear on the status line indicating that the screen has been dimmed. To display is restored when a key is pressed.

2.7.3 Power Saver

This is a built-in function to save power. If the workstation is ON and not active (i.e. no keyboard or host input) for more than two hours the screen dims indicating that the power saver function is enabled.

Power consumption is reduced by up to 50% and emission of radiation from the workstation is also greatly reduced.

The green LED on the front of the workstation turns to orange. When a key is pressed, the optional mouse is moved or data is received from the host, the workstation automatically returns to normal, full power operation. Existing data on the screen remains untouched.

3. OFFLINE SETUP

Offline setup allows you to configure the following: number of sessions and their addresses, display character set, printer address and emulation, type of ASCII printer, printer symbol code page and workstation language. In addition, the offline setup defines the display sessions model ID and alternate addresses.

The default parameters for all the offline setup screens are given in Appendix-A.

IMPORTANT !!!
Perform the offline setup *before* connecting the workstation to the Twinax line.

3.1 Overview

3.1.1 Entering Offline Setup

1. Power-on the workstation (turn the switch on the electronics box ON) and *keep the Spacebar pressed* during initialization.
2. An indicator light (on the monitor or box depending on the type of workstation) will be turned on and within a few seconds the Offline Setup screen will be displayed:

Parameter Definitions:

Customize Workstation	Provides access to screens for configuring the number of sessions, their type and addresses, in addition to defining the character sets and language definitions.
Update Serial Number	Enables you to set the workstation serial number.
Test workstation	Provides test screens for testing functions for system devices (keyboard or mouse, monitor).

3.1.2 OFFLINE Setup Function Keys and Indicators

3.2 Offline Customization Setup

3.2.1 Defining Sessions, Addresses and Modes

The workstation supports up to four sessions and an additional printer session. You may assign each session a unique address, or select one address to be shared by *all* the defined sessions (not including the printer).

To enter the screen

From the Offline Setup menu, select Customize Workstation and press Enter. The following screen will appear.

This screen allows you to define the number of sessions, session addresses and character sets. In addition, the printer session is enabled and defined in this screen. Enabling the printer sessions option, displays the printer related parameters such as *emulation type* and *address*.

The various options are described in the following sub-sections.

3.2.1.1 Display Sessions	<p>Sets the Number of Display Sessions supported by the workstation.</p> <p>Value = 1 to 4</p>
3.2.1.2 Printer Sessions	<p>Enables a printer session. The printer is directly connected to the display station and acts as a host printer.</p> <p>Enabling this parameter (Yes), activates the <i>printer address</i> and <i>Printer emulation mode</i> which must be defined as well.</p> <p>In addition, you may access the Printer EBCIDIC to ASCII translation table by pressing T, and the Bypass Table by pressing B. These functions are described in chapter 6.</p> <p>A “Help” screen is provided by pressing Help while displaying either EBCIDIC or Bypass screen.</p>
3.2.1.3 Shared Addressing	<p>Each of the assigned terminal addresses may be defined as a <i>shared</i> address and used by all the terminal sessions. Sessions sharing a single address are independent of each other. The host and application must support shared addressing for this function to work.</p> <p>Device addresses should be provided by the System Manager.</p> <p>Set the parameter to No, for multiple sessions where the host system or controller will communicate with the workstation as if two/three independent workstations are attached.</p>

3.2.1.4 Display Address 1 to 4	<p>The unique host connection address for each defined display station 1 to 4 (depending on the number of enabled sessions).</p> <p>The address is defined as 'occupied' by an 'asterisk' to all other sessions addresses including that of the printer.</p> <p>A maximum of 7 addresses are available per port, enabling the user to connect sessions of more than one display station to a port. Up the 28 sessions can be assigned to each port when shared addressing is enabled.</p>
3.2.1.5 Printer Address	<p>The unique host connection address for the printer.</p> <p>The address is defined as 'occupied' by an 'asterisk' to all other sessions addresses including that of the printer.</p> <p>Value: 0 to 7</p>
3.2.1.6 Character Set	<p>The character set used by the workstation.</p> <p>Multinational: A standard set of multinational characters.</p> <p>Country Specific: A character set specific for your country. The character set and language used on your workstation, is selected in the Country Specific screen.</p>
3.2.1.7 Printer Emulation	<p>Four Printer Emulation options are available: 5256; 4214; 5219; 3812</p> <p>Refer to the tables in Appendix-B to select the appropriate printer emulation (listed in descending order of preference).</p>

3.2.2 ASCII Printer Model Type

This screen enables you to define the printer emulation mode and character code.

To enter the screen

From the **Offline Setup** menu, select **Customize Workstation** and page forward until the following screen is displayed.

Define the parameters according to the explanations given below.

3.2.2.1 Printer Model/Type

Type of printer or printer emulation.

Other: Select *Other* if your printer is not listed above.

When *Other* is selected as *Printer Type* and the key **E** is pressed, a **Printer Control Editor** screen is displayed where the printout can be customized (LPI, CPI etc.).

Refer to chapter 6 for a detailed explanation.

3.2.2.2 Symbol Code Page

Defines the printer character set as follows:

ASCII 7-bit character set.

437 Also referred to as IBM Character Set 2.

ECMA-94 European Standard.

850 IBM Standard providing the complete range of accented alpha characters required for international language support.

Roman-8 Hewlett-Packard Roman 8 character set with Roman 8 symbol extension.

DL-IBM Character set downloaded to the Proprinter printer by the workstation via the escape strings which are specifically formatted for the Proprinter XL. These escape strings set up the dot patterns for the character set. The set formed in this way is equivalent to the 850 set.

DL Epson 9 Downloaded to the printer by the workstation via escape strings which are specifically formatted for the Epson FX series of printers. The set formed in this way is equivalent to the 850 set.

3.2.3 Keyboard And Country

This screen enables you to define the type of keyboard and language used on the workstation.

To enter the screen

Select **Customize Workstation** from the **Offline Setup** menu and page forward until the following screen is displayed.

3.2.3.1 Keyboard Type

Type of keyboard installed on the workstation.

Standard keyboard: Assigns a standard keyboard configuration.

User Defined: Selecting this option enables the Keyboard ID options from which you can select the keyboard.

Keyboard ID: A number representing a user defined keyboard.

3.2.3.2 Country

Defines the language in which the workstation screens are displayed.

3.2.4 ASCII Printer Type

This screen allows you to define either a standard ASCII printer type or a user defined printer. In addition this screen defines the start position corresponding to the *Paste* command.

To enter the screen

Select **Customize Workstation** from the **Offline Setup** menu and page forward until the following screen is displayed.

3.2.4.1 ASCII Printer Type

Defines the type of printer connected to the workstation.

Standard: A standard printer

User Defined: Enables the selection of an ASCII Printer ID for downloading a PDT (Printer Definition Table) identified by the selected ASCII printer ID from the AS/400. Your System Manager can help select the correct option.

ASCII Printer ID: This field represents the ID of a PDT downloaded from the AS/400.

3.2.4.2 Paste Start Position

This option defines the starting position where copied data will be pasted (chapter-8).

Text cursor: Pastes the data according to the position of the Text Cursor.

Mouse Pointer: Pastes the data according to the position of the Mouse Pointer.

3.2.5 Alternate Addresses for Display Sessions

This screen enables you to define the alternate addresses for each session.

To enter this screen

Select **Customize Workstation** from the **Offline setup** menu, and page forward until the following screen is displayed.

3.2.5.1 Alternate addresses

After power up, the Workstation will test the line to check for busy addresses.

If the address defined in Setup is occupied by another workstation, this terminal will set the station address to the first "not busy" address from the *alternate list*.

If all alternate addresses are busy, a message will be displayed and the session will go offline.

3.2.6 Model ID and Alternate Addresses for the Printer Session

This screen enables you to define the Model ID and alternate address for the printer session and for display session-4.

To enter this screen

Select **Customize Workstation** from the **Offline setup** menu, and page forward until the following screen is displayed.

NOTE: This is the last screen in the Customization menu. Press F3 to return to the Main offline setup menu where you may select the next option.

NOTE: Select 5291 if the workstation is connected to an old controller since these support only Model ID 5291 and a 122-key keyboards.

3.2.6.2 Alternate Addresses

Up to four alternate addresses can be defined for display sessions and the printer.

Selecting *No* disables this function.

3.3 Serial Number

This screen allows you to enter the number used for network control, workstation manufacturing plant and the machine serial number printed on the label located at the underside of the Logic Box.

To enter this screen

Select **Update Serial Number** from the **Offline setup** menu, press enter.

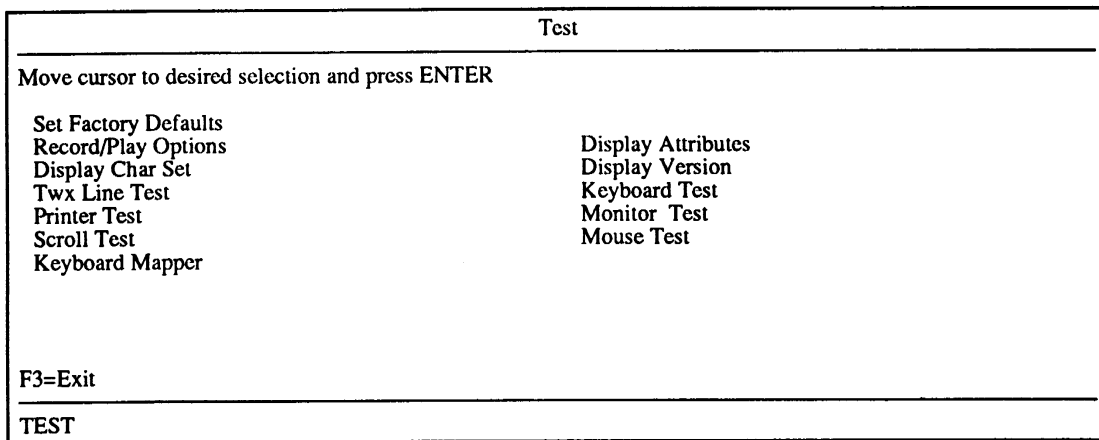
3.3.1.1 Plant of manufacture	Select a character from each row. The corresponding characters will be highlighted in the Machine Serial field.
3.3.1.2 Serial number	This is the number used for network control. Select a character from each row. The corresponding characters will be highlighted above the Machine Serial field.

3.4 Test Menu

This menu is used for testing various options and resetting to factory defined values.

To enter this screen

Select **Test Workstation** from the **Offline setup** menu and press enter. The following screen will be displayed. Select and enter each option to be tested.



NOTE: You may set the Factory Defaults and the Record/Play options. It is recommended that all the other test options are used only by service personnel.

3.4.1 Set Factory Defaults

This screen enables you to reset or clear the following parameters: Addresses, system printer emulation, printer model/type, code page, display language, keyboard mapper, as well as gate codes, bypass codes and record/play keys.

1. Press **Enter**. Respond with **Yes** to the verification message “Are you sure (Y/N)?”
2. The message “Restoring Factory Defaults, Please Wait.”, will be displayed.

3.4.2 Record/Play Options

The **Record/Play Options** panel with the following three options will be displayed:

R0 - The full record/Play function is available.

R1 - Non display input is prohibited.

R2 - The Record/Play function is disabled.*

***IMPORTANT!! If you select R2, the Record/Play option can only be re-enabled by a company representative.**

The Record/Play function is fully described in Chapter-6.

3.4.3 Display Attributes

The Attribute screen will display.

The following six attributes are shown on screen:

For monochrome monitors: NORMAL; COLUMN SEP; REVERSE; BLINK; HIGH INTENS;
UNDERScore

For color monitors: Seven color attributes.

3.4.4 Display Char Set

This option enables you to display the character sets for all the following models:

- 80 columns x 25 rows
- 80 columns x 33 rows
- 80 columns x 44 rows
- 132 columns x 28 rows
- 80 columns x 50 rows

To display the character set

1. Select **Display Char Set** from the Test menu.
2. Press Enter to display the first character set, and the Spacebar to view other sets.
3. Press F3 to exit to the Test menu.

3.4.5 Display Version

This screen displays the workstation version.

1. Select **Display Version** from the Test menu.
2. Press Enter to display the workstation version.
3. Press F3 to exit to the Test menu.

3.4.6 Twinx Line Test

This screen enables the initiation of a Line test. The online test is performed continually and updates its status continually until it is terminated (by pressing F3).

1. Select **Twinox Line Test** from the Test menu.
2. Press Enter to initiate the test.

Device addresses from 0 to 6 are listed and their status determined. A blinking *Line Testing...* message appears at the bottom of the screen.

- * will appear bellow each listed address of a device that is communicating with the host controller.
- = will appear bellow each listed address of a device that is not present on the system or which did not communicate with the host controller.
- will appear bellow each listed address of a device that the host controller did not attempt to communicate with (Polling).

3. Press F3 to exit to the Test menu.

The test is being continuously performed, that is to say, if the status of any device on the line, or the status of the line itself changes, after a few seconds the status message on the screen will change accordingly.

The addresses of the devices are the addresses set in the SETUP as the address of the workstation/printer, with no relation to the logic address defined on the computer, such as P1, W12, etc.

3.4.7 Keyboard Test

Enables the Keyboard Test screen.

1. Select **Keyboard Test** from the Test menu.
2. Press Enter to display the keyboard test screen.
3. A keyboard map is displayed. When a key is depressed, the parallel key on the screen is highlighted.
4. Press F3 to exit to the Test menu.

3.4.8 Printer Test

Enables the test screen for a parallel printer.

1. Select **Printer Test** from the Test menu.
2. Press Enter to display the printer test screen.
3. Press Enter to initiate the test.
4. Press F3 to exit to the Test menu.

3.4.9 Monitor Test

Enables the Monitor Test screen.

1. Select **Monitor Test** from the Test menu.
2. Press Enter to display the Monitor test screen.

3.4.10 Scroll Test

Enables the Scroll Test screen.

1. Select **Scroll Test** from the Test menu.
2. Press Enter to enter the test which displays a continually rolling screen.
3. Press F3 to exit to the Test menu.

3.4.11 Mouse Test (for PS/2 mouse)

Enables the Mouse Test screen.

1. Select **Mouse Test** from the Test menu, and press Enter.
2. Press Enter to enter the test.

Moving the mouse in any direction will cause a similar movement of the mouse icon on the display. Clicking either mouse button will highlight the parallel button on the screen simulation.

3. Press F3 to exit to the Test menu.

3.4.12 Keyboard Mapper

This option enables the redefinition of a key function.

To enter the test

Select **Keyboard Mapper** from the Test menu and press Enter.

To Map a Key

1. Select the key to be redefined (i.e. F12). The corresponding key on the screen will be highlighted.
2. Press the Record key on the keyboard
3. Press the key (ie. Dup PA1).whose function is to be transferred to the first key (F12).
4. Repeat steps 1 to 3 for any additional keys.
5. To exit after mapping your selected keys, press Reset.
6. To activate the keyboard mapper press the Setup key to enter **Online Setup**.
7. Choose *Setup Display*. Press Enter.
8. Move cursor to *Enable Keyboard Mapper*, highlight **YES** and press the Space bar.
9. To exit **Online Setup** press F3 twice. This will return you to the sign on screen. ("KM" will be displayed under the status bar indicating the Keyboard Mapping is activated.)

To Clear All Mapped Keys:

1. Enter Offline Setup. (turn the workstation ON while depressing the Space bar.)
2. Select Test Workstation. Press Enter.
3. Select Keyboard Mapper and press Enter. Press **Alt + F1** to clear all mapped keys and return the keyboard to the factory preset conditions.

NOTE: The mapped keys may also be temporarily disabled by setting the enable Keyboard Mapper parameter in Online Setup to NO.

4. ONLINE SETUP MENU

Online setup enables you to set or reset some of the Workstation's features at any time during operation. It also enables you to view what values have been selected in Offline Setup. Online Setup can be accessed at any time during a work session.

This chapter will provide a brief description of the options available in the online setup menu.

Type Style, System Code Page, Paper Feed, Form, Source Drawer and the option *F2=Resume* are displayed only if 3812 or 5219 printer emulation option has been selected in the Offline Setup **Customization** screen.

When the following four conditions are selected simultaneously, the host can suspend the print operation and display the request for changing the current type style, system code page, paper feed technique, form or source drawer on the 22nd line of the Printer Information panel.

- Display-Printer terminal mode
- 3812 or 5219 emulation type
- Setup Printer panel, **Attention** is enabled.
- Any of the following five setup printer parameters are set to *System*:
 - System code page,
 - Type style,
 - Paper feed,
 - Form, and
 - Source drawer

4.5.1.1 Example

Assuming that a host system requests a type style change from *011 Courier 10* specified in the Printer Information screen, to *087 Letter Gothic*, and the other items are unchanged, the type style on the Printer Information screen will automatically change to *087 Letter Gothic*, and the change request will be displayed at the bottom of the screen.

If the font cartridge on the attached printer does not include *087 Letter Gothic*, change it to one that does, and then press '. The print operation with the type style will start. If the requested cartridge is not available, press ' to ignore the host request.

For detailed information on how to change the type style, system code page, paper feed mechanism, form type, or source drawer type, refer to your printer's Operation Manual.

If you do not want the print operation to be suspended by the host system, select No for the Attention parameter in the Setup Printer screen.

If the printer is printing data when it receives a request for changing the type style, system code page, paper feed mechanism, form type, or source drawer, the data transmission from the workstation to the printer will be immediately suspended but the printer may continue printing data stored in the print buffer.

If the printer is defined as "Other" and the Source Drawer codes are set in the Printer Editor, the drawers will be selected automatically.

4.6 Setup Input Devices

Enables keyboard and mouse related such as sound and response speed.

4.9.1 Customizing the Foreground and Background Color Palettes

This option enables you to define the colors on your color palette.

1. Page forward (**F8**) from the **Setup Color** screen, to display the **Setup Background Color Palette** screen. The assigned colors are displayed above the color bars.
2. Use the *left* and *right* Arrow keys to move the cursor to the desired color bar.
3. Press the Spacebar to mark the bar with two arrow.
4. Use the *up* and *down* arrow keys to select the desired shade and press the Spacebar to enable the selection.
5. Repeat steps 2 to 4 for every color you wish to assign to the color palette.
6. Press **F8** to display the **Setup Foreground Color Palette**
7. Repeat steps 2-4 for every color you wish to assign to the Foreground Color Palette.
8. Press **F7** to return to the **Color Setup** screen, or **F3** to return to the **Online main setup** menu.
9. Press **F10** to apply the default pallet.

NOTE: Ensure that the color *names* displayed above the bars, correspond to the color they represent.

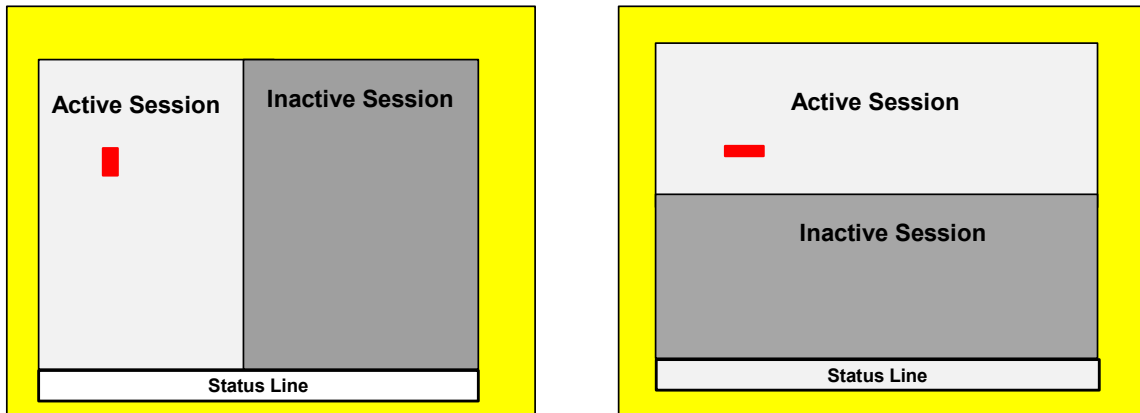
5. ENTERING SESSIONS

The workstation can operate up to four sessions with either unique or shared addresses. Two sessions may be displayed simultaneously in *Split Screen* mode; however, only one session can be active at a time and the cursor will appear in that session. Sessions may also be displayed in *Full Screen* mode where one session occupies the full screen.

5.1 Split Screen Description

The screen may be split either horizontally and vertically. The status line corresponds to the active session.

In order to enable split screens, the *Display Sessions* parameter in the *Customization* panel of **Offline Setup** must be set to display more than one sessions (2, 3, or 4). Setup parameters can be viewed in *Browse Display Information* of **Online Setup**.

5.1.1 Status Line Description

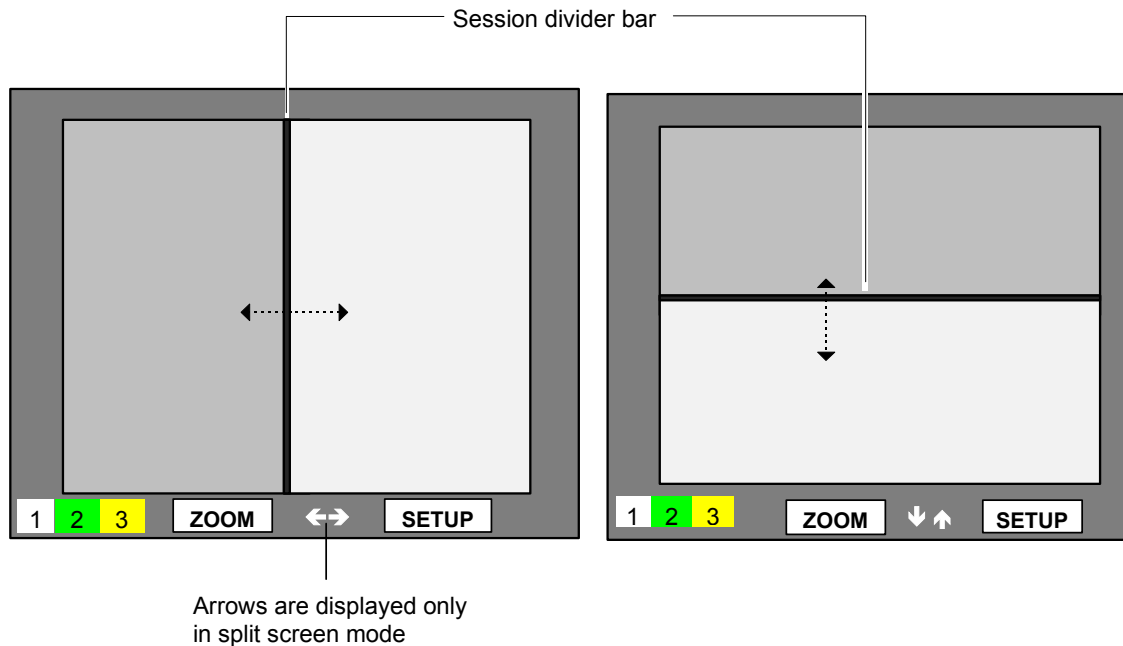
The status line indicates existing sessions and active session number (either 1, 2, 3 or 4) on the left and various indicators like system available, keyboard shift, input inhibited, etc. This line is common to all sessions.

The active session number is displayed in reverse video and is highlighted. If two sessions are displayed in the screen, both session numbers will be displayed in reverse video but only the active session will be highlighted.

Two screen buttons will be displayed on the status line when the mouse is enabled: **ZOOM** for toggling between full and split sessions; **SETUP** for entering **Online Setup**.

5.1.2 Scrolling and the Divider Bar

The line dividing the screen into two sessions is called the **Divider Bar**. The divider can be moved, and the number of lines per session altered.



NOTE: Error 9034 will display on the status line when the separator line reaches the logical screen boundaries and cannot be moved further.

6. RECORD AND PLAY OPERATION

6.1 Record Play Operation

The Record/Play option enables you to record frequently used text or keystrokes and assign them any of the 24 available function keys. The recorded sequences can be “played-back” by pressing the corresponding function key. Approximately 4000 keystrokes can be recorded including **Shift** and **Alt** keys.

6.1.1 Recording a Sequence

1. Press either the **Record** key (122-key keyboard) or Alt + Record key (102/103-key keyboard).

A “Record” indicator appears in the status line together with a number indicating the approximate number of keystrokes that can be recorded and the function keys (record ID keys).

2. Press the function key to be assigned to the key sequence. The selected function key is displayed on the status line.

An alarm will sound if this key has already been assigned. Press either the Record key (122-key keyboard) or Alt + Record key (102/103-key keyboard) to exit the Record mode without changing the prior key sequence.)

3. Enter the keystrokes.

NOTE: All the recorded keystrokes of the selected function key can be deleted by pressing **Alt +Reset**.

4. Press **Record** to Exit the Record.

NOTE: For 102/103-key Keyboards, twenty-four function keys are available based on F1 to F12 and Shift + F1 to F12.

6.1.2 Displaying a Recorded Sequence

1. Press **Shift + Play** (for 122-key keyboard) **Alt + F6** (for 102/103-key keyboard).
2. The prompt **Fkey No.?** is displayed. Press the appropriate key. The sequence is displayed on the screen message line.
3. To view additional key sequences, press another function (Fx) key. Each key sequence is displayed as the corresponding function (Fx) key is pressed.
4. To return to normal operation press **Shift + Play** (for 122-key keyboard) **Alt + F6** (for 102/103-key keyboard).

6.1.3 Deleting Recorded Key Sequences

To delete the recorded key sequences in a function keys

1. Press the **Record** key.
2. Press **Shift + Erase Input** for 122-key keyboard or for the 102/103-key keyboard, press **Alt + Record**.
3. Press **Alt + Erlnp**.

6.1.4 Pause Feature

Use the Pause feature to enter data while replaying the key sequence.

1. Press the **Alt + Pause** keys (122-key keyboard) or **Shift + Pause** (102/103-key keyboard) as part of the recorded key sequence.
2. A Pause symbol appears on the status line indicating that you may enter data in normal operation, without recording.
3. To renew the recording of keystrokes, press the **Alt + Pause** keys (122-key keyboard) or **Shift + Pause** (102/103-key keyboard) again and enter the required keystrokes.
4. **NOTE:** When playing back the keystrokes in the Play Mode, the replaying temporarily stops (pauses) at the position that the Pause was recorded. The Pause symbol appears on the status line.
5. The user can enter the required data in normal operation. To resume playback, simply press **Play**. The display station continues with the recorded sequence.

6.2 Play Mode Procedure

To “Play” the key sequence:

1. Move the cursor to the desired input position.
2. Press **Play** (122-key keyboard) or press **Alt + F5** (102/103-key keyboard). The “Play” indicator appears in the status line together with a representation of function keys (record ID keys).
3. Press the required function key to begin playback.
4. To return to normal operation, press **Play**(122-key keyboard) or press **Alt + F5** (102/103-key keyboard).

Pause In Play Mode

If the playback stops and “**Play**” appears on the status line, enter the Pause Mode. Type the required data in normal mode. Return to playback by pressing **Play** (122-key keyboard) or press **Alt + F5** (102/103-key keyboard).

The Play message disappears from the status line.

6.3 Record/Play Limitation Keys

The record/play function may be changed to prohibit input in a non-display field (like a password input) or the record/play function may be totally disabled.

To limit the record/play functions for data security purposes, enter the Test screen and select the Record/Play option. Select one of the following:

- R0 - No protection (default)
- R1 - Non-display field protection
- R2 - Record/Play Function disabled.

When **R0** - *No protection* is selected, any data can be recorded and played without any restriction. The workstation defaults to this value.

When **R1** - *Non-display field protection* is selected, data keys marked “XX” cannot be entered in non-display fields on the following keyboard layouts. If this is attempted, the workstation automatically exits record mode and an error code, 9021, will be displayed on the operating status line.

When **R2** - *Record/Play function disabled* is selected, access to the record/play function is denied. If this is attempted, the error code 9020 is displayed.

7. MOUSE AND EDITING FUNCTIONS

7.1 Copy and Paste

Copy and Paste enables you to copy a selected or 'marked' section and insert it elsewhere either in the same or different session.

This feature can be activated by keyboard or mouse. However, the keyboard limits the function to a character string mode only.

7.1.1 Copying and Pasting a Character String

To copy and paste a character string using the keyboard:

NOTE: This feature must be enabled in the Display Online Setup.

1. Position the cursor on the first character to be marked.
2. Press **Alt + 1** (on numeric keypad).
3. Move cursor to the end of the character string to be marked and press **Alt + 1** (on numeric keypad).
4. Position the cursor where the string is to be inserted and press **Alt + 2** (on numeric keypad). The character string will be copied to the new place and the marked region will return to normal.

To insert the string in a different session, press **Alt + Jump** and position the cursor.

5. To *Unmark* a character string without copying, press **Alt + 3** (on numeric keypad).

To copy and paste a character string or block using the mouse:

NOTE: This feature must be supported by the host in order to be enabled.

1. To define the section, press on **Shift** and click-and-hold the left mouse button over the defined text. Release the button.

To insert the section in a different session, press **Alt + Jump** or click on the required session number on the status line to make it active.

2. The starting position of data pasted will be the position of the text cursor or mouse pointer depending on the selection made in Offline Setup. Move the text cursor or mouse pointer to the position where the data is to be pasted.

3. To paste the string, press **Shift** and click the right mouse button.
4. The data will be pasted. The same data can be pasted an unlimited number of times or until the workstation is switched OFF or until another string or block is copied.





7.2 Using the TAB Key

Use the Tab feature to move the cursor between columns (similar to a word processor screen). The tabs are displayed as vertical lines on the session's last line.

Press **Alt + Field Advance** to advances to the next tab position (after you release the keys). The cursor will stop at the end of a line if there are no more Tabs.

7.2.1 To Enter the TAB Setup Panel

1. In Online Setup, Setup Display – Local Tabs, select Yes.
2. Press **Alt + Setup**.
3. The status line at the bottom of the screen will display options available and keys for the following functions:

Function	Operation
Set a tab	Use the arrow keys to set the tab position and press 
Clear a tab	Move the cursor to the tab which you want to delete and press Alt + 
Clear all tabs	Shift + 
Save tab setting.	Tab settings may be stored in volatile memory for future sessions. Press S

7.2.2 Hot Spot Highlighting Using the Mouse

To perform the operation assigned to the menu item on the system menus, move the mouse pointer next to the menu item; then, click the primary mouse button.

To perform the operations assigned to the F1 to F24 keys and the “+” or “-” characters, position the pointer on them and click.

7.2.3 Automatic Cursor Position

To move the text cursor to the mouse pointer position, click the primary mouse button.

8. PRINTING

This chapter describes printer related options such as the *Bypass* and *Gate* features, that enable implementing special features (barcode printing, portrait/landscape mode, etc.) of the attached printer, on the host application.

In addition, this chapter describes the local print options.

8.1 Bypass Feature

The Bypass Feature is used to transparently send controls from a host application to the ASCII printer enabling special printer features such as, bar code printing, portrait/landscape modes, etc., on the attached ASCII or laser printer to be implemented in the host application.

Up to eight hexadecimal key sequences of ten bytes each can be defined and stored in the “Bypass Table”. The sequence is represented by a one or two character bypass code.

The Bypass codes and the corresponding hexadecimal sequences are configured in the Bypass Table within the Printer Control screen. Refer to your printer’s user manual for the printer escape sequences.

To disable/enable the Bypass feature

Position the cursor to *Bypass - Printer Substitution Enable YES* and press the Spacebar to toggle it between YES and NO.

8.2 Gate Feature

The Gate feature is similar to the Bypass feature and uses the same configuration table to configure the Gate code. However, this feature enables entering the printer sequences directly into the host application as opposed to the above-mentioned Bypass sequences.

The *Gate* feature allows using an unlimited number of printer codes, instead of a single 10-character sequence. The printer codes are delimited by the Gate code before and after the sequences.

To disable/enable the Gate feature

Position the cursor to *Gate - ASCII Pass Thru Enable (Yes)* on the Bypass Table screen and press the Spacebar to toggle it between YES and NO.

8.3 Bypass Table

To display the Bypass Table

Press 'B' in the Offline Setup screen.

8.3.1 Example - 1: Using the Bypass Feature

To send the commands *Start Italics* and *Stop Italics* on an HP LaserJet Plus laser printer:

1. Display the Bypass Table by entering the Offline setup and pressing 'B'.
2. Use the arrow keys to position the cursor on the Bypass Number Field.
3. Enter "%" and "1".
4. The ASCII sequence for Start Italics is 1B 28 73 31 53 29. Enter this sequence into the following field.
5. Use the arrow key to move the cursor to the next line. Enter "%" and "2".
6. Enter the escape sequence: 1B 28 73 30 53 28 (Stop Italics command for HP LaserJet Plus) into the following field.
7. Implement the Start Italics code in the host application by entering the Bypass code characters "%1" before the text that is to be italicized. Enter the code "%2" to stop italics after the desired text. The commands are sent to the printer during the print session.. In this example, the bypass code for Start Italics is "%1". The bypass code for Stop Italics is "%2".

8.3.2 Example 2- Using the Gate Feature

In this example, a Reset command is sent to an Epson printer. (The escape sequence is 1B 40.)

1. Define the Gate code as "%&".
2. In the application file, enter the Gate code followed by the Reset command and end with the Gate code again. "%& 1B 40 %&".

8.4 Printer Control Editor

A printer not listed in the *Printer Type* options (Customization panel) can be defined with the help of this Editor.

1. Enter *Customize Workstation* in Offline Setup. The *Customization* screen is displayed.
2. Press **F8** to display the next screen.
3. Select *Other* for printer type and press **E**. The Printer Control Editor screen is displayed.

Enter control codes of printer as described in your printer manual. If your printer does not support some of the functions, delete those function fields. After you finish editing Control codes, press **S** to save changes in non-volatile memory.

8.5 Printer EBCDIC to ASCII Translation Table

IBM 3X/AS 400 computers perform printing in EBCDIC code. Parallel printers work with ASCII codes. The workstation's printer emulation performs EBCDIC to ASCII translation according to the Translation Table stored in memory. When you get a new workstation, it's EBCDIC to ASCII translation table is preset to the Standard Table matching your country's EBCDIC and ASCII codes. If you need to print some special characters or you have a printer with a non-standard character set, you can change the Translation Table as you wish.

8.6 LOCAL PRINT FEATURE

The Local Print feature allows printing the contents of the currently active session displayed on screen to an attached parallel printer without host intervention.

8.6.1 To Perform a Local Print

1. Select LOCAL for Print Key in Online Setup.
2. Verify that the attached parallel printer is turned on and is ready to receive a print job from the workstation.
3. Press **Print** to display the Print screen. The print screen will have a Status line at the bottom displaying printer messages in the form of symbols and Print operation keys.
4. Press **F13** (Only if the Status line displays *F13 = Screen.*)
5. Press **Enter** to print screen contents.

8.6.2 Trim Area




The region to be printed, known as the *Trim Area*, can be selected on screen:

1. Press **Print** to display the Print screen.
2. Press **F13**. (Only if the Status line displays *F13 = Trim.*) A rectangle with a cursor at the top left corner will display. This represents the region to be printed.
3. Use the arrow keys to define the print region.
4. Press **F14** to move the cursor in the rectangle from the top left corner to the bottom right corner.
5. Press arrow keys to increase or decrease print region as required.
6. Press **Enter** to print the screen region selected.
7. Press **Print** to exit without printing.

NOTE: If SYSTEM is selected for Print Key in Online Setup, you can still perform LOCAL PRINT by pressing **Shift + Print** simultaneously.

8.7 Printer Status Symbols on Status Line

The following symbols indicate the current status of the printer. They are displayed on the status line during a local print function.

Alice's Paperless Desk offers convenient on-line office services that save time and space. Among the features provided are: Telephone Directory, Alarm Calendar, Character Set Table, Alarm Clock, Calculator and Note Pad.

9.1 Alice Main Menu

The Alice Main Menu lists the available features and shows the key sequences used to display a specific feature.

This screen allows you to set the time used by all clock related activities, enable the display of pop-up messages and set some security related features.

9.7 Calculator

The built-in calculator can be used to add, subtract, multiply, divide, calculate percentages and use memories. Numbers on the screen can be used to perform calculations and answers can be pasted on the screen.

The calculator *functions* can be enabled from a session (Alt + F1) and calculations performed and viewed on the status line, without affecting the screen or communication.

The calculator *help* screen is accessed from the Alice menu.

The screen contains a Ruler on which the Left Margin, Right Margin and Tabs can be set. The maximum width of the Ruler is 778 characters.

9.8.1 Editing Functions

1. Use the left and right arrow keys to position the cursor on the left and right margins and set them by pressing **L** (on the left margin) and **R** (on the right margin).
2. Press **T** to set tabs and clear tabs.
3. Press Enter to begin editing.
4. Press **Help** to display the help screen for editing functions such as **bold**, underline, block markers, etc.

9.8.2 Word Wrap and Justification Feature

Note Pad has automatic word wrap. In addition, if the cursor is moved to a point other than the left margin and then you begin typing, each of the following lines will begin from the same point (text is always justified left). To begin a line in a different position, simply position the cursor on the desired point and begin typing.

9.8.3 Status Line

Press Enter to display a status line indicating the cursor position, editing mode (**insert/replace**) and attributes (**bold** or/and underline).

Insert: Inserted text will be typed next to existing text.

Replace: Inserted text will replace existing text.

21.8.7 Deleting

Text may be deleted one character at a time, one line at a time, or a defined region (Block) at a time.

To delete one character at a time

Press **Del**, to delete one right character at a time.

Press **Backspace**, to delete one left character at a time.

To delete one line at a time

Press **Alt + E**

9.8.4 Editing Blocks

The Note Pad allows you to delete, copy and paste sections (blocks) of text.

To delete a block

1. Mark the block by positioning the cursor on the beginning of the block, pressing **Alt + M**, moving the cursor to the end of the region to be defined as a block and pressing **Alt + M** again.
2. Press **Alt + D** to delete the block.
3. **To unmark the block**, press **Alt + R**.

To copy a block

1. Mark the block by positioning the cursor on the beginning of the block, pressing **Alt + M**, moving the cursor to the end of the region to be defined as a block and pressing **Alt + M** again.
2. Move the cursor to the place in the document where you want the block to be inserted and press **Alt + S** to insert the block.

To unmark the block

Press **Alt + R**.

10. TROUBLESHOOTING

The following table will help you in case you have trouble operating the workstation or connecting it to the computer.

10.1 Blank Display

<p>Picture does not appear on the screen, the indicator light is ON.</p>	<p>Turn the Contrast and Brightness control knobs to maximum. If the picture does not appear within 30 seconds, turn the workstation off and call a service representative.</p>

10.3 Communication Failure

1. Make sure the workstation is connected to the Twinax line.
2. Check that the unit is physically connected to the cable before the workstation actually works; if it has a termination switch, make sure it is in position 2.
3. Check that the address of the workstation is correct, defined on the computer and that the workstation is ON LINE (VARY ON PENDING).
4. Check that the termination switch of the last device on the line (if it has one) is in position 1.
5. Turn the workstation on while holding a key depressed and perform the *Twx Line Test*. If "NO LINE ACTIVITY" appears, check the cable contact and interchange the cables.

If the previous test was successful (i.e. you see line activity and identify the active units), the problem may be in the definition or identification of the workstation towards the computer.

10.4 Communications Problems:

10.4.1 General Troubleshooting: Disturbances, Communication Failure

- Check that there are two units on the same line with the same address.

»»»The workstation identifies itself also as a printer that occupies an address, even if there is no printer physically connected to the workstation. In order to prevent the workstation from being identified as a printer, set the terminal mode to one display or two display. Refer to Section 4.3.

- Check that the termination switch of the last device on the line is in position 1.
- A problem with the electrical system of a lack of grounding may be the cause of communication disturbances.
- Damaged cables between the units may cause disturbances in communication.

10.4.2 Keyboard Produces Incorrect Characters for Some of the Keys

1. The workstation is defined in the computer as 5251 or 5291 instead of 3487 or 3486.
2. The keyboard type defined in the computer is not correct.
3. The keyboard ID defined in the computer is not correct.
4. Refer to above text.
5. Disable the keyboard mapper, go to Offline Setup and check the keyboard mapping.

10.5 Printer Problems

Some of the characters are not printed correctly, or extra characters are inserted in the printout.

- Check that Bypass Table is cleared and EBCDIC to ASCII table is correct. Load default EBCDIC to ASCII table. Refer to Section 9.7.

- If the problem is not solved, Reset Factory Defaults. Refer to Section 4.9. This will clear your terminal setup. You will have to define all your setup parameters in Offline and Online Setup.

- Define the printer driver as Null.

- Change the printer cable.

To check the printer driver and printing character set:

1. Initialize EBCDIC to ASCII table to default.
2. Select the Code Page 850.
3. Enter the Workstation test menu and select Printer test run. Check the results.

APPENDIX.A DEFAULT SETUP VALUES

Setup Panels are provided for setting up the display station characteristics. The values entered are stored in non-volatile memory allowing parameter retention when the display is powered off. There are two types of setups: Offline and Online.

Offline setup defines the number of sessions and their addresses, as well as printer session and emulation mode. In addition, offline setup defines language and keyboard related characteristics.

Online setup defines the visual display characteristics (session colors, cut-and-paste mode, etc.) and security options, setup of devices (printer), and the calculator.

20 DIFFERENCES FROM IBM SYSTEM PRINTERS

This section describes the differences between the workstation's system addressable printer and the actual IBM system printers which are emulated.

Differences Which Apply to All Emulations

All workstation system addressable printer emulations support the ASCII Transparent (ATN) SCS command. The ATN command performs a function similar to the ASCII Transparent and Printer Substitution features at the SCS command level. The ATN command must appear in the data stream in binary hex form. This requires special application programming. The ATN command has the following format:

03 nn data

Where:

nn The number of data bytes following NOT including nn.

Data The data bytes to be passed through to the attached printer.

The workstation system addressable printer does not report graphic check errors. The workstation system addressable printers do not stop upon receiving the SCS BELL Command. For the workstation, the BELL command will cause the alarm to sound in the attached printer but no unavailable status will be reported to the host and printing will continue. IBM system printers will print all buffered data, sound the alarm and go unavailable to the host. On an IBM system printer, printing will not resume until the start button is pressed at the printer.

The actual IBM system printers have small print buffers, and the data remains in the host spool file until it is printed. The attached printers, and therefore, the workstation system addressable printers, have large print buffers, which are quickly filled with the print data. The workstation may be receiving print data from the host spool file several pages ahead of what is actually printing. Therefore, a print job may be deleted from the host spool file long before it is actually printed. Once a print job has been deleted from the host spool file, the print job cannot be restarted unless the job is rerun. The maximum form length supported by the workstation system addressable printer is 45.5 inches.

Differences From IBM 5256 Operation

The 5256 emulation provided by the workstation uses the same character sets as the IBM 4214 system printer. Several characters are missing from the IBM 5256 system printer's character sets. These characters are replaced with the 4214 characters. The characters affected are as follows:

The "Less Than or Equal Sign" is replaced by a lower case "y" with an acute accent.

The "Up Arrow" is replaced with an upper case "Y" with an acute accent.

The "Not Equal Sign" is replaced by an "Overscore".

The "Peseta" symbol is replaced by a "Bullet".

The "Greater Than or Equal Sign" is replaced by a "Dot-less i".

Differences From IBM 4214 Operation

The workstation's 4214 emulation does not support BGR and APF graphics. The workstation's emulation also ignores Load Alternate Characters (LAC) and Transparent (TRN) SCS commands. In some cases, invalid data may be printed.

The workstation 4214 printer supports line densities in 1/72nds of an inch. All vertical margins and line densities are truncated to the nearest 1/72nd of an inch. To avoid alignment problems, specify line density in even multiples of 1/72nds (i.e., 20/1440ths).

Differences From IBM 5219 Operation

The workstation 5219 printer supports horizontal motion in 1/120ths of an inch. All horizontal positions are truncated to the nearest 1/120th of an inch. To avoid alignment problems, specify horizontal margins in even multiples of 1/120ths (i.e., 12/1440ths). Neither the IBM 5219 system printer nor the workstation 5219 printer support orientation changes.

If a PSM font is selected, the workstation 5219 printer assumes that the character widths of the resulting font are equivalent to the character widths of the 5219 printer's PSM fonts.

Differences From IBM 3812 Operation

The Set Form Feed Control (SFFC) and Execute PMP SCS commands are not supported. Orientation changes not occurring on a page boundary may cause unpredictable results. Character set support is limited to the character sets listed in section 19.

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APPENDIX C. 5219 & 3812 FONT SUPPORT

This section lists all IBM Global Font IDs (GFIDs) supported by the 486 print drivers and includes special application notes.

NOTE: Some printers do not have font substitution lists; only general guidelines are given for these printers.

Adobe PostScript

The PostScript driver supports the 35 standard Adobe PostScript fonts. Monospace GFIDs will cause the PostScript proportional fonts to simulate monospace printing. All other GFIDs use the monospace Courier, Courier Bold or Courier Oblique fonts. Printing which requires precise placement of text, such as tables of data created with tabs, should be printed using a Courier GFID. Proportional spaced GFIDs (PSM) are not fully supported; most PSMs will use Times or Helvetica.

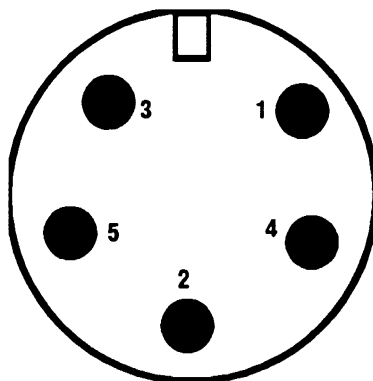

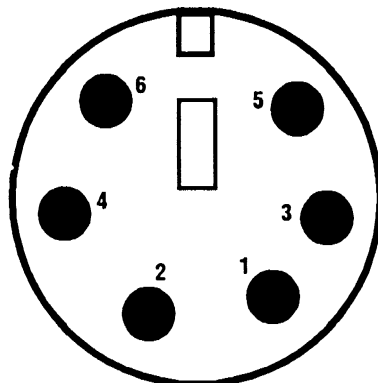
