IBM System i


What is System i5 Access for Web?

End users can leverage business information, applications, and resources across an enterprise by extending the System i5 resources to the client desktop through a web browser

- Provides access to System i5 through a browser
 - 5250 access
 - Access to database, integrated file system, printers, output queues, jobs
 - Can run batch commands and send/receive messages

• It has the following advantages:

- Is server based
- Requires only a browser on the client, no configuration required at desktop, no applets installed on desktop
- Uses industry standard protocols -HTTP, HTTPS and HTML





- Use the following User ID and password to sign into the EXPERIENCED USER page:
- User ID of WUSER
- Password of DEMO2PWD

This shows the basic look of Access for Web as we ship it. You can try various functions -including working with printer output and the options we provide. You can click on the 5250 tab, sign onto the System i5, then start an RPG application called BOATS and run it.

- Start up a different another browser session to same url address above, and use the following User ID and password to sign into the Access for Water INEXPERIENCED USER page:
- User ID of BOATADMIN
- Password of DEMO2PWD

This is an example of how you might design a web page for your company's use. You will see that an end user could start the same BOATS application by clicking on the 5250 session -- or they could have used WebFacing or HATS LE to run the application. Click on all 3 links and see the same application in different views. You will also see other links that would let a user work with spoolfile information, work with IFS, run database requests, etc..



 - Java application run on Linux or any client with a JVM
 - Uses existing System i5 Access family servers
- Internet-based applications
 - Java applications run on System i5 web server
 - Access from any browser

- Licensed program
 - Supported by IBM
 - Fixes via System i5 PTF's
- Open source version
 - Supported by open source community and IBM service
 - Modify the source for your own use
 - Submit source fixes and improvements



 - 64-bit PowerPC or System i5 LPAR (New for V5R4)
 - 64-bit PC (AMD x86-64/EM64T) (New for V5R4)
 - 32-bit PowerPC or System i5 LPAR
 - 32-bit PC (i386)
- Toolkit included (New for V5R4)
 - ODBC, EDRS
 - Remote Command, Program Call
 - Security and Conversions
