Gentran:Server provides the easy-to-use tools you need to electronically exchange data with your trading partners, including:

- data translation
- process control
- communications system

We believe that you will find this software and the supporting materials easy to use and directly beneficial to your business.

Gentran:Server**

Installing the Gentran:Server for Windows software also involves configuration of Windows and your database product. It is important to analyze the tasks you need to perform before undertaking the installation of Gentran:Server.

Note

The CD keys for installing the Gentran:Server Options Pack software are located on the packing list that was shipped with your Gentran:Server product.

What's in this Manual

Introduction

This manual provides pre-installation and installation instructions for Gentran:Server (Single Workstation System). It includes our recommendations on how to configure your system for the easiest installation and operation of Gentran:Server.

This manual uses a task-oriented approach that is intended to answer any questions you may have about Gentran:Server installation with step-by-step instructions.

Intended audience

This manual is intended for local administrators responsible for the following:

- installing and implementing EC
- installing and implementing your database product

Prerequisite knowledge

This manual assumes that you are familiar with using a PC, Microsoft® Windows Server functions, and database administration.

Description of contents

The *Installation Guide* is organized into the following chapters:

- *About this Guide* explains the content, organization, and conventions in this guide. This chapter also defines the key terms used in this manual and explains how to get support for Gentran:Server.

 - *Chapter 2, Installing a Single Workstation System*, explains how to install Gentran:Server for the first time and implement that installation. This includes configuring your Windows operating system, installing and configuring your database management system, and installing Gentran:Server.
 - *Chapter 3, Post-Installation Tasks*, describes additional tasks you must perform to complete the Gentran:Server installation. This includes starting the system, implementing security, and validating your installation.
 - *Appendix A, SQL Server 2000 Setup*, outlines the tasks necessary to install and configure a new SQL Server 2000 installation.
 - *Appendix B, Oracle Setup*, outlines our recommendations for setting up Oracle for use with Gentran:Server.
 - *Appendix C, Installation Troubleshooting*, provides background information on how to troubleshoot the installation of Gentran:Server and explains the course of action that you should follow to resolve some common installation failures. This chapter also includes InstallShield® error messages.

Key Terms Used in This Manual

Introduction	This section defines the Gentran:Server proprietary terminology that is used in this manual. We recommend that you familiarize yourself with this terminology before proceeding further in this <i>Installation Guide</i> .
Client Access Components	The <i>Client Access Components</i> provide the user interface to setup, maintain, and control the Gentran:Server system.
Communication Controller	<p>The <i>Communications Controller</i> regulates communication between Gentran:Server and the organizations (value-added networks (VANs) or trading partners) with whom data is exchanged.</p> <p>Notes</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• To be a communications controller, your machine must be capable of sending and receiving files via a modem or other communications device.• In a Single Workstation system, all three controllers (communications controller, process controller, and the primary Gentran system controller) all reside on the same machine.
Database	<p>Gentran:Server uses a <i>relational database</i> on your machine to store system data. This database enables multiple users to access the same data. The database tables contain indicators which point to the actual data, which is located in the system data store (the system data store is the repository of all shared Gentran:Server data). Gentran:Server uses ODBC™ (Open Database Connectivity) to use databases from different vendors.</p> <p>Note</p> <p>See the <i>Getting Support Card</i> to determine which database management systems have been certified for use with Gentran:Server.</p>
Gentran:Server Executive	The <i>Gentran:Server Executive</i> is the service that controls execution of the communication and translation functions on a defined server. The Gentran:Server Executive is installed on the <i>primary Gentran system controller</i> (your single workstation machine) in a Gentran:Server system. The Gentran:Server Executive also centrally regulates system-critical information.
Gentran Poller	The <i>Gentran Poller</i> is the Gentran:Server Executive component that polls at set intervals for the existence of specified files.
Gentran Scheduler	The <i>Gentran Scheduler</i> is the Gentran:Server Executive component that checks all timed events at set intervals for scheduled events.

Integration Components

The *Integration Components* are optional components that provide the user interface to the Gentran:Server Application Integration and Forms Integration subsystems.

- The Application Integration subsystem enables you to generate import, export, and document turnaround translation objects.
- The Forms Integration subsystem enables you to generate screen entry and print translation objects.

The Integration Components also allow you to access Gentran Standards for creating new translation objects.

Notification

The *Notification* subsystem enables you to notify users (who are specified as Operators) when a predefined event occurs. You can specify notification parameters that prompt the system to generate any combination of the following:

- a message box alert to user interface clients running the Notification program
- an e-mail message
- a message to a digital pager when a specified audit message is written to the Audit Log
- a process control task to be executed when a specified audit message occurs

Reference

See the “Using the Audit Notification System” chapter in the *Administration Guide* for more information about using the Operators user interface.

Notes

- Only process control events that are set up as “notification” type events in Process Control can be selected as tasks to execute if the predefined event occurs.
- If you specify a task that is suspended in Process Control, the task will not be executed when the predefined event occurs.

ODBC

ODBC (Open Database Connectivity) is used by Gentran:Server to use databases from different vendors.

Primary Gentran System Controller

The *primary Gentran system controller* is your Single Workstation in the Gentran:Server system. The primary Gentran system controller maintains status information for the entire system, controls the management and dispatching of processing requests within the system, and controls all other system components.

Notes

- The primary Gentran system controller is not the same as a “primary domain controller,” which is a Windows term.
 - In a Single Workstation system, all three controllers (communications controller, process controller, and the primary Gentran system controller) all reside on the same machine.
-

Process Controller

The *Process Controller* component is the part of the Gentran:Server software that regulates the management and dispatching of processing requests within the system. The process controller allows the system translation load to be distributed for fast and efficient throughput.

Note

In a Single Workstation system, all three controllers (communications controller, process controller, and the primary Gentran system controller) reside on the same machine.

System Configuration

The *System Configuration* program enables you to modify system-wide configuration parameters, including the following:

- system data store folders
 - security mode
 - client notification parameters
 - audit parameters
 - controller settings
 - interval for overdue acknowledgement checking
 - interval for acknowledgement generation
 - interval for acknowledgement reconciliation
 - interval for automatic file concatenation
 - ODBC data source used by the system
 - import specifications
 - splitter entries
 - user parameters and logons
 - stopping and starting the Gentran:Server Executive, Gentran Scheduler, and Gentran Poller services
-

System Data Store

The *system data store* serves as the repository of all shared Gentran:Server data. The system data store resides on your Single Workstation. There is only one system data store in the Gentran:Server system.

Getting Support

Introduction The Sterling Commerce Gentran:Server software is supported by trained product support personnel who are available to help you with product questions or concerns.

Note

Gentran:Server Customer Support does not support non-Sterling Commerce products (such as SQL Server and Oracle), but they can assist you in configuring non-Sterling Commerce products to work with Gentran:Server.

Phone number For assistance, please refer to your *Getting Started Guide* to determine which support phone number you should use.

Before calling support

- Attempt to recreate any problem that you encounter and record the exact sequence of events.

System Data Store	The machines that contain folders in the system data store
Error Messages	The exact wording of any error messages received and the point in the software where the error occurred, as well as any log files
Attempted Solutions	The steps you took attempting to resolve the problem and the outcomes, including the estimated number of times the problem occurred and whether it can be reproduced

Introduction

Before you begin

Before you begin the installation process, you need to familiarize yourself with several concepts in the Gentran:Server system configuration and installation process.

This manual is designed to help you understand the order of configuration and installation tasks, the resources you need, and the information that you need to obtain.

Installation Prerequisites

Introduction

Installing the Gentran:Server for Windows software also involves configuration of Windows and your database product. It is important to analyze all of the tasks you need to perform before undertaking the installation of Gentran:Server.

Necessary personnel

Prior to configuring your system and installing Gentran:Server, you need to make sure that the appropriate people are available. We strongly recommend that your system and database administrator take part in the installation for the following reasons:

- On your Single Workstation, you need to log on with a Windows login that has administrative rights on that machine.
- You must create folder shares to the folder in which the system data store is installed.
- You must create a new database and you may need to add users to the database.

Your local administrator is typically the only person that has the authority to complete the above.

Warning

It is very important that your local administrator be involved in the configuration and installation of Gentran:Server.

Gentran:Server Overview

Introduction

Gentran:Server for Windows is a combined data translation, process control, and communications system that operates in the Microsoft Windows environment. This product is primarily designed for the translation and communication of EDI and other similar types of data.

Process control

Through the process control system, you can integrate Gentran:Server with a variety of business applications in a manner that makes it a complementary extension of the application, rather than a cumbersome add-on. Gentran:Server is an intelligent, high-volume messaging system that links business systems and provides opportunities to link existing business processes and the World Wide Web.

Communication system

Gentran:Server links internal business systems to each other and to the business systems used by customers and suppliers around the world. Gentran:Server routes application-to-application messages over direct lines and value-added networks (VANs) to completely automate the transactions you exchange with customers and suppliers. Translation occurs automatically, twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, according to predefined schedules or events. This enables you to streamline your business operations.

Unattended mode

Gentran:Server also operates in an unattended mode. When errors occur, or when human intervention is necessary, designated people are notified via pagers or system messages. Audit trails and message tracking enable you to know precisely where a message is in the process, at any time.

Gentran:Server Executive Service

Gentran:Server uses the Gentran:Server Executive Service, which controls the execution of communication and translation functions. The Gentran:Server Executive enables Gentran:Server to run on Windows servers even when no users are logged on to the system.

Gentran Poller

The *Gentran Poller* is the Gentran:Server Executive component that polls at set intervals for the existence of specified files.

Gentran Scheduler

The *Gentran Scheduler* is the Gentran:Server Executive component that checks all timed events at set intervals for scheduled events.

Windows environment

Gentran:Server was specifically designed to take full advantage of the Windows environment. Your Single Workstation must run on one of the following Windows versions:

- Windows 2000 Server
- Windows 2003 Enterprise Edition
- Windows 2003 Standard Edition
- Windows 2000 Professional

Gentran:Server is deployed in this environment through a combination of a *database*, *system data store*, and *primary Gentran system controller*. These system components are installed on your Single Workstation.

Installation Components

Introduction

Installation components are functional components of Gentran:Server that you can select when you install Gentran:Server on your Single Workstation. The following are the installation components:

- Client Access Components
 - Process Controller (this component is installed automatically on your Single Workstation)
 - Integration Components
-

Client Access Components

The Client Access Components provide the user interface to setup, maintain, and control the Gentran:Server system, including the following:

- The Electronic Commerce (EC) Manager (data management component) serves as a high-level navigation tool, as well as a document management tool. It contains windows, browsers, and dialog boxes to view and maintain document, interchange, audit, reporting, process control, communications, and translation object information.
- Partner Editor allows you to define, edit, and delete all partner information for your company and for all of your trading partners.
- Document Editor is a data entry tool that allows you to create, modify, and view documents.
- The *Notification* subsystem enables you to notify users (who are specified as Operators) when a predefined event occurs. You can specify notification parameters that prompt the system to generate any combination of the following:
 - a message box alert to user interface clients running the Notification program
 - an e-mail message
 - a message to a digital pager when a specified audit message is written to the Audit Log
 - a process control task to be executed when a specified audit message occurs

Reference

See the “Using the Audit Notification System” chapter in the *Administration Guide* for more information on using the Operators user interface.

- System Configuration enables you to modify system-wide configuration parameters after Gentran:Server is installed. You can modify system data store folders; define or redefine the security mode; add, change, or delete system import specifications; change splitter options; define client notification parameters; add, change, or delete users; stop and start Gentran: Server services on the controllers in your system and change controller settings for every controller in your system; and change the system ODBC data source and audit settings.
 - Mailbox Server Manager allows you to manage your Gentran:Server mailbox system.
-

Process Controller

A Gentran:Server Process Controller is always installed, by default, on the Primary System Controller. The Process Controller functions are run by the Gentran:Server Executive Service (RPCSRV.EXE), which must be started to execute most of the functions available from the EC Manager as well as any unattended session events that you have configured.

Note

The Process Controller component is automatically installed on your Single Workstation. The Process Controller component installs the Gentran:Server Executive Service on each process controller. This service must be started on the process controller for the system to successfully execute unattended processing.

Integration Components

The Integration Components are optional components that provide the user interface to the Gentran:Server Application Integration and Forms Integration subsystems.

- The Application Integration subsystem enables you to generate import, export, and document turnaround translation objects.
- The Forms Integration subsystem enables you to generate screen entry and print translation objects. When these translation objects are registered with Gentran:Server and selected as part of a trading relationship, they allow you to facilitate the keying and printing of documents that you receive inbound or send outbound.

The Integration Components also allow you to access Gentran Standards for creating new translation objects. The Gentran Standard files can be accessed from CD-ROM or transferred to a computer hard drive.

System Components

Introduction

The Gentran:Server system consists of several logical components. Each system must have the following:

- primary Gentran system controller
- system data store
- database

Primary System Controller

There is only *one* primary Gentran system controller in each Gentran:Server system. The primary Gentran system controller maintains status information for the entire system, controls the management and dispatching of server processing requests within the system, and controls all other system components.

The process controller components of the system, the Gentran:Server Executive Service, and the Gentran:Server Mailbox service are automatically installed on the primary Gentran system controller. Additionally, the following installation components may be optionally installed on the primary Gentran system controller (your single workstation):

- Client Access Components
- Integration Components

Recommendation

We recommend that you install both components on your Single Workstation system.

System Data Store

There is only *one* system data store in each Gentran:Server system. The system data store serves as the repository of all shared Gentran:Server data.

Database

Gentran:Server uses a relational database to store tracking, audit, process control, translation object, and partner information in tables. The database tables contain indicators that point to the actual data, which is located in the system data store (the system data store is the repository of all shared Gentran:Server data). This relational database enables multiple users to access the same data. Gentran:Server uses ODBC to use databases from different vendors. The relational database is installed on your Single Workstation.

Post-installation Security Recommendations

Introduction Gentran:Server security enables you to protect your data from unauthorized access, yet still allow easy access to authorized users. Gentran:Server security enables you to use the integrated features of the Windows operating system and your database product.

This section contains our recommendations for the configuration of Gentran:Server security. You do not configure security until after you install Gentran:Server. (See *Modifying Security Parameters* in the *Administration Guide* for more information about setting up security in Gentran:Server.) However, if you use our recommendations to determine how you are configuring security, you can ensure that your users are able to easily access Gentran:Server.

Security modes The three security modes that are supported by Gentran:Server are Integrated, Mixed, and Standard.

Recommendation

Set the security modes for Gentran:Server and your database to be the same. We recommend that you use Integrated security mode unless you are using an Oracle database. For Oracle databases, you must use Standard security mode.

Integrated *Integrated* security mode (recommended) allows you to take advantage of the Windows operating system security, including encrypted passwords, password aging, and domain-wide user accounts. This mode does not prompt users to sign on to Gentran:Server if the user's ID is the same for Gentran:Server and for Windows. In this mode, when you have configured only one system, you do not have the opportunity to log in to Gentran:Server as another user unless the login fails or the user logs out of Windows and another user is logged in. If a login failure occurs, the system displays the Login dialog box to ensure access to the system.

Mixed *Mixed* security mode always prompts the user with the Gentran:Server Login dialog box. The Windows user name is defaulted. If the user's Gentran:Server user ID is the same as it is for Windows, the user can click **OK** on the Login dialog box. In this case, the password is not validated and the user is logged in to Gentran:Server. If the user changes the default user name, the system prompts the user for a password that is validated before logging in to Gentran:Server. This enables the user to easily log in as himself/herself, but also allows the capability to log in as another user.

Standard *Standard* security mode always requires the user to log in to Gentran:Server. The Windows user name is defaulted on the Login dialog box.

**Recommended
security**

The following are our security configuration recommendations:

- Set the security modes (Integrated, Mixed, or Standard) for Gentran:Server and your database to be the same so your database does not require you to log on separately.
 - For SQL Server, use *Integrated* security mode, which allows you to take advantage of the Windows operating system security, including encrypted passwords, password aging, and domain-wide user accounts.
 - For Oracle, you must use *Standard* security mode.
 - If you are running Gentran:Server in *Integrated* security mode, you should set up the Gentran:Server User ID for each user to be the same as the Windows User ID for that user. If this is the case, the users are not required to log on to Gentran:Server.

Introduction

In this chapter

This chapter contains the information you need to install Gentran:Server on a Single Workstation system (one machine).

Notes

- After installing Gentran:Server for the first time, you need to complete other implementation tasks, including starting the system, adding users to the system, creating communication ports, and validating the installation. This information is provided in chapter 3, Post-installation Tasks.
- If you are installing Gentran:Server for the first time, you will use *Installing Gentran:Server* on page 2 - 8. If you are upgrading from a previous version of Gentran:Server, you will use *Upgrading Gentran:Server* on page 2 - 30.

Recommendation

Complete the pre-installation tasks prior to using the Setup program to install Gentran:Server.

Prerequisites

This chapter assumes that you have already installed the appropriate Windows operating system on your machine, as well as either SQL Server or Oracle.

Reference

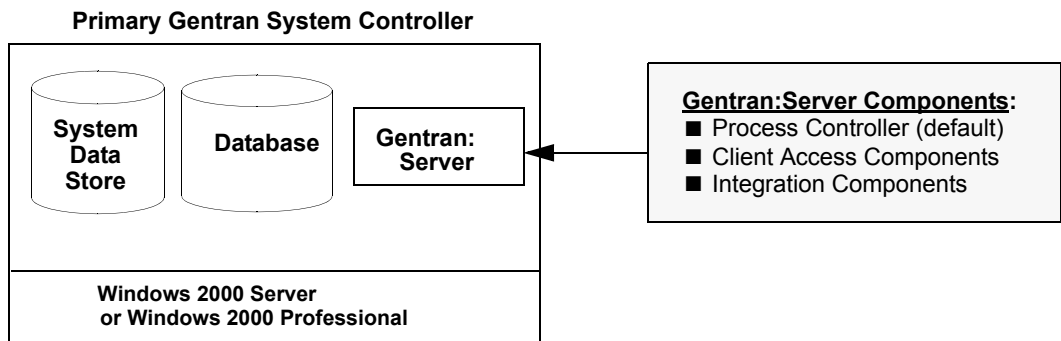
See the *Getting Started Guide* for more information about which operating system and database management system versions are supported with Gentran:Server.

This installation also assumes that you have a basic understanding of Windows and SQL Server/Oracle terminology and functionality and that you have access to a database administrator (DBA).

Single Workstation Overview

Introduction A Single Workstation system consists of one machine. In this system, all Gentran:Server installation components you need are installed on one machine.

Sample single workstation system The following diagram illustrates a sample Single Workstation system, consisting of one machine, which contains all Gentran:Server installation components.



The Installation Process

Introduction

The following sections contain the prerequisite information and preliminary tasks that you need to complete prior to installing Gentran:Server on your single workstation. You should complete these pre-installation tasks prior to using the Setup program to install Gentran:Server.

To install Gentran:Server on this machine, you need to use the Setup program with either the **Create a new Gentran:Server system** option or the **Upgrade your existing installation** option to make that machine the primary Gentran system controller.

Process

The following table lists the tasks you need to complete to install Gentran:Server on a Single Workstation system. This table is included as a high-level overview of the installation sequence.

Task	Description
1	Create/Verify Users: On your single workstation, add any new users and verify existing Windows logons for Gentran:Server users.
2	Create the Windows Global Group and Add Users: On your single workstation, create a global group that contains all Gentran:Server users by adding the Windows logons for Gentran:Server users to the group.
3	Create the Windows Local Group and Grant Access to the Global Group: On your single workstation, create a local group that contains the global group you created.
4	Add Windows User Rights to the Local Group: On your single workstation, assign the local group the user rights that Gentran:Server requires.
5	Create/Share Folder for System Data Store: Create the system data store folder and share it for the group of users you created.
6	Install and Configure your Database: For specific instructions, please refer to the appropriate appendix for the type of database management system you are using.
7	Install/Upgrade Gentran:Server: Use the Setup program to install or upgrade Gentran:Server on your single workstation.

How to Create and Share the System Data Store Folder

Creating the system data store folder

You need to create the folder where the system data store resides on your machine and share it for the GENTRANUSERS group. You need to complete these tasks now because otherwise you need to interrupt the Gentran:Server installation process to share the Gentran:Server folder after the installation program creates it. You determined the UNC pathname for the system data store in the checklist, **item 2** on page 2 - 6.

Note

We recommend that you use the default GENSRVNT folder for the location where the system data store resides.

Sharing the system data store folder

You also need to share the folder where the system data store resides (GENSRVNT) for the GENTRANUSERS group. You need to give the group “Full Control” permission to access the drive/folder. This gives the users in the GENTRANUSERS group permission to fully manipulate files (read, write, create, delete) and allows them to set permissions above the file level (for example, folders).

Note

For security reasons, you may not want users to have access to the entire drive of the machine on which the system data store resides. In this case, just share the folder.

Creating the system data store folder

Use the following procedure to create the folder for the system data store.

Step	Action
1	Navigate to and select the drive on which the system data store resides.
2	Create a new folder named GENSRVNT .

Sharing the system data store folder

Consult your Windows documentation for information about how to share the GENSRVNT folder.

Notes

- To complete the installation of a Single Workstation system, you must be logged on to Windows as a local administrator.
- If you ever need to uninstall Gentran:Server, see the *Administration Guide* for information about using the Gentran:Server Installation Setup program “Leave a system” option.

Gentran:Server for RosettaNet prerequisite

Warning

The Gentran:Server for RosettaNet depends on the Microsoft Internet Information Service (IIS) for HTTP-related communications. Since the use of IIS requires the Gentran:Server for Windows dynamic libraries to be open, the installation of the Gentran:Server release will fail if IIS is running during installation. Therefore, we recommend that you stop the IIS service *before* installing Gentran:Server.

You can stop IIS by stopping the **World Wide Web Publishing Service** and the **IIS Admin Service** from the **Services** dialog box (select each service from the list and click the **Stop** button). You can access the Internet Services dialog box from your **Start** menu by selecting **Settings > Control Panel > Administrative Tools**, and then selecting **Internet Services Manager**.

Note

Be aware that if you use Gentran:Server for RosettaNet and are upgrading from Gentran:Server for Windows 3.x to 5.1, there are tasks you will need to perform after installing Gentran:Server for Windows 5.1 and Gentran:Server for RosettaNet 5.1, and you should allot time to complete these post-installation tasks.

Troubleshooting a failed installation

Setup maintains a log of every scripted command that it executed. Automatic recovery determines the point at which the install process failed and attempts to resume installation from that point. It does not reverse the previously executed commands. The following are examples of the type of errors that this automatic process recovers from:

- the database server crashing or being accidentally unplugged
 - the network failing
 - a power outage
-

Backing up your database prior to upgrade

Prior to upgrading Gentran:Server, we recommend that you perform a synchronous backup of your entire Gentran:Server system, including the database, data store, and your Windows registry. After performing the backup, you should verify its integrity.

Upgrading a test machine

Prior to upgrading Gentran:Server in your production environment, we recommend that you upgrade the system on a test machine first, then migrate to your production system.



Gentran:Server uses a relational database to store tracking, audit, process control, translation object, and partner information in tables.

The database tables contain indicators that point to the actual data, which is located in the system data store (the system data store is the repository of all shared Gentran:Server data). This relational database enables multiple users to access the same data.

Gentran:Server uses ODBC (Open Database Connectivity) to use databases from different vendors, including SQL Server.

Note

ODBC and Microsoft Data Access Components (MDAC) are installed when you install SQL Server.

Summary of tasks

Note

This appendix outlines the tasks necessary to configure an SQL Server *only* when you are installing the SQL Server for the first time.

Prior to installing Gentran:Server, you must complete the following tasks:

1. Create the database that contains the Gentran:Server tables. (These database tables are built during the Gentran:Server installation.)
2. Add users to your database management system and give them permission to access the Gentran:Server database.
3. Configure the ODBC data source name (DSN) for use with your database.

Pre-installation Requirements

Reference See the *Getting Started Guide* for more information about the required software that is certified for use with Gentran:Server.

SQL Server space requirement SQL Server 2000 requires more available hard disk space than the previous versions. The SQL Server Setup installation program allows you specify where to install the SQL Server program and data files. However, the Setup program also installs files in the system directory, and you cannot change the system file location.

Reference See the SQL installation documentation for more information on hard disk space requirements.

How to Back up your Database

Overview We recommend that you back up your SQL Server database periodically. We also recommend that you perform the database maintenance endorsed by Microsoft.

Reference

Any issues relating to backing up or restoring your SQL database, and any questions on the use of any Microsoft maintenance utility, should be referred to Microsoft. Microsoft product information, support, and additional resources are available at the following website:

Backup considerations

You should consider the following questions before creating your backup strategy:

- How often should backups be performed?
 - Which data should be backed up (for example, full database or transaction log)?
 - To what medium will the backup be written (for example, tape or disk)?
 - Will the backups be performed online (while users are working) or would it be prudent to schedule them after hours?
 - Will the backups be performed manually or using an automatic scheduling facility?
 - If the backups are performed on an automatically scheduled basis, how can you verify that a backup occurred without errors?
 - How long will you save a backup before you reuse the storage medium?
 - If necessary, how long will it take you to restore the system using the last backup?
 - Do you have a procedure by which you can ensure that previous system backups are still intact and can be reapplied if necessary?
 - Where will you store backups?
 - Do the necessary people have access to the storage facility?
 - Who is responsible for overseeing the backup process and ensuring that it is performed correctly?

How Gentran:Server uses databases

Gentran:Server uses a relational database to store tracking, audit, process control, transaction object, and partner information in tables.

The database tables contain indicators that point to the actual data, which is located in the system data store (the system data store is the repository of all shared Gentran:Server data). This relational database enables multiple users to access the same data.

Gentran:Server uses ODBC (Open Database Connectivity) to use databases from different vendors, including Oracle.

Note

The default Oracle ODBC drivers are installed when you install Oracle. If you need to use drivers other than the default drivers, you must install them separately.

Summary of tasks

Prior to installing Gentran:Server, you must be familiar with Oracle and must set up Oracle for use with Gentran:Server.

Additionally, your Oracle database administrator (DBA) must either create a new instance (database) for Gentran:Server or set up new table space for Gentran:Server in an existing instance.

The steps you need to perform to complete these tasks are specific to the database management system you are using.

In this appendix

This appendix outlines our recommendations for setting up Oracle for use with Gentran:Server.

Reference

See your Oracle documentation for specific instructions about how to perform these tasks.

Install SQL *Net

Introduction

Prior to installing Gentran:Server, SQL *Net must be installed and configured on your machine. This software enables the machine to interface with Oracle.

The name of the alias (SQL *Net Connect String) is determined by your Oracle DBA. There are no naming restrictions.

Note

The alias name is referenced in the ODBC Setup. You should record this name for later use. Other versions of Oracle also refer to SQL *Net as a “Net Service.”

Define New Tablespace for Database Tables

Introduction

We suggest that you define a new tablespace in Oracle where the Gentran:Server database tables can be created. This ensures that the database tables are not created in the system tablespace.

Create New DB Administrator Account

Introduction

Prior to installing Gentran:Server, we recommend that you set up a new database administrator (DBA) account to be used to create the database tables when installing Gentran:Server.

Recommendation

We recommend that you use the same Windows administrative account that the Gentran:Server Executive service uses to log on to Windows.

When creating the new DBA logon, assign the new tablespace you created for the Gentran:Server database tables to be the default for this account.

Note

The Gentran:Server database tables are created under the schema of this account.


Add Gentran Users to Oracle

Introduction You must add each Gentran:Server user to Oracle. Oracle does not interface with Windows security, so if you set up a Windows group containing all Gentran:Server users, Oracle does not recognize the group.

The roles (rights) that you must grant to these users are the following:

- Update

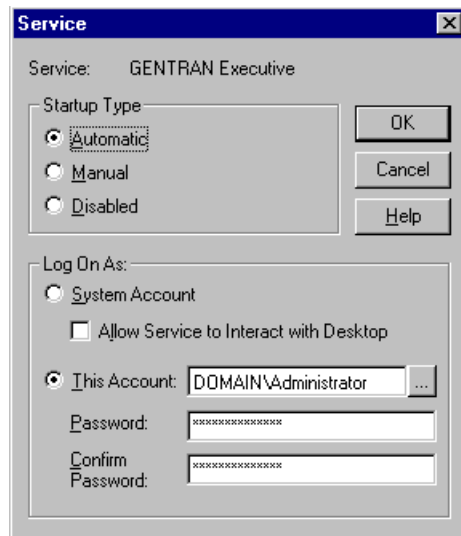

We recommend that you use the same Windows administrative account that the Gentran:Server Executive service uses to log on to Windows. We also recommend that this account is the same as your database administrator account.

After Gentran:Server is installed, this is the account that is displayed when you select the Gentran:Server Executive service on the Services dialog box and click Startup (to display the Services dialog box, select Programs > Control Panel > Services from the Start menu).

Diagram

The following is an example of the Service dialog box, which displays the account that the Gentran:Server Executive service uses to log on to Windows.



Change the Default Number of Open Cursors

Introduction The default number of open cursors allowed in Oracle is 50 (this number may vary depending on which version of Oracle you are using). To run production electronic commerce (EC), an average company may need this number set to 5000 or greater.

You need to change the number of open cursors in the Oracle Startup file, which is typically located in ORACLE\ORADATA. The name of the Startup file is "init****.ora", where "****" is the name of the instance.

Note

Oracle 9i uses a PFILE and SPFILE for configuration purposes.


Procedure To change the number of open cursors, add the following line anywhere in the Startup file:

```
open_cursors = 5000
```

Note

For Oracle 9i, you must add this line into the PFILE.

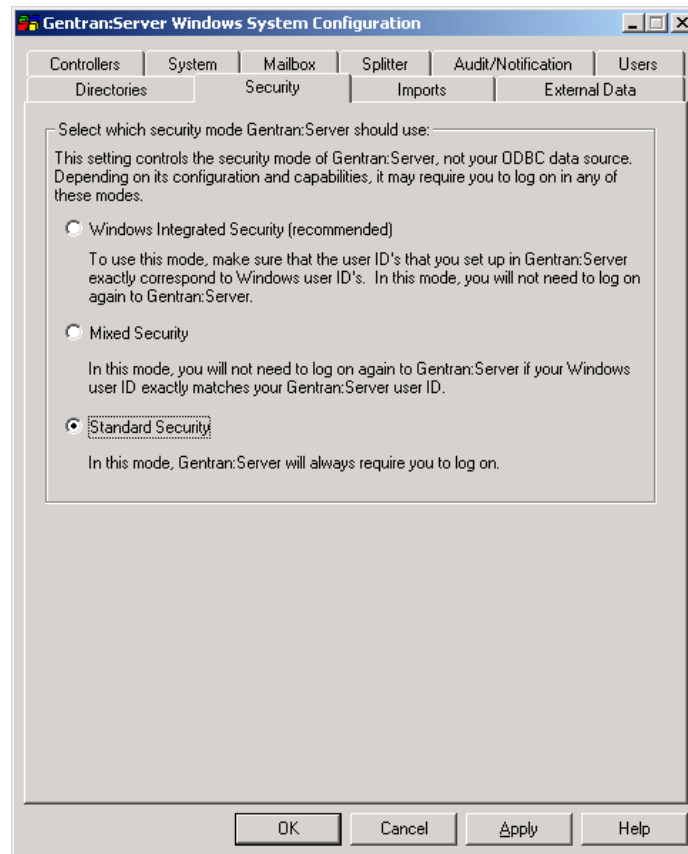

Use Standard Security Mode with Gentran

Introduction For Oracle users, we recommend that you accept the default Gentran:Server security mode, which is *Standard*. Standard security mode always requires the user to log on to Gentran:Server. The Windows user name is defaulted on the Logon dialog box.

Diagram The Security tab of the Gentran:Server System Configuration dialog box is configured (by default) as follows:



Procedure In Post-installation Tasks, chapter 3 of this guide, we recommend that you set the Gentran:Server security mode to *Integrated* (security options are set on the Security tab of the System Configuration subsystem). Disregard the recommendation of using Integrated security and the How to Implement Security section in that chapter.

Warning

We strongly recommend that you do *not* use Integrated (or Mixed) security with Oracle, because Oracle security does not interface by default with Windows security.

Use Oracle Database ODBC drivers with Gentran:Server

Introduction

There is an issue with the Oracle ODBC drivers that prevents Gentran:Server for Windows from working properly with the ODBC drivers supplied by Oracle for use with Oracle databases. Sterling Commerce has contacted Oracle and it is a known issue in their ODBC drivers that causes the ADO RecordCount property to always return a value of -1. The Oracle BUG number for checking on the status of fixes for this issue is 11962102.600.

Effect in Gentran:Server

The Oracle ODBC issue only affects the Gentran:Server Audit Notification service because this service uses this function of ODBC in its programming. No other Gentran:Server services use this function, and thus they are not affected by this issue.

Warning

If the ODBC driver is not installed and configured before Gentran:Server is installed or upgraded, the Gentran:Server Audit Notification Service will fail to start. And, this prevents any other Gentran:Server services from starting. Additionally, failure to install or upgrade the ODBC driver may result in database corruption.

Resolution

Until Oracle resolves this issue, you must use two ODBC Data Sources as a “work-around” resolution. After following the directions in either *Procedure to use before installing a new Gentran:Server 5.1 system* on page B - 11 or *Procedure to use before upgrading a Gentran:Server version 3.x system* on page B - 13, your system will use two Data Source Names (DSNs)—one DSN using the Microsoft ODBC for Oracle driver and the other using the ODBC driver supplied by Oracle. The Microsoft DSN is associated with the Gentran Audit Notification Service and the Oracle DSN is associated with Gentran:Server Mailbox, Gentran:Server Executive, and Gentran:Server Communications services.

Note

See the *Getting Started Guide* for the supported version information for both the Microsoft Data Access Components (MDAC) and the Oracle ODBC driver. The Microsoft ODBC for Oracle driver is installed when you install MDAC.

This appendix describes background information about how to troubleshoot Gentran:Server installations and explains course of action you should follow to resolve common installation problems.

This appendix also contains a list of common InstallShield error messages and some suggestions on locating the source of the errors.

Gentran:Server Installation Troubleshooting

Problems and resolutions

The following table contains some common Gentran:Server installation problems and the steps you should take to resolve them.

Problem	Resolution
<p>The Setup program successfully completes, but you get a database logon failure message when you attempt to log on to Gentran:Server.</p>	<p>You did not specify the appropriate database login during installation.</p> <p>Remove all installed Gentran:Server components. See <i>How to Add or Remove Components</i> in the <i>Administration Guide</i> for more information.</p> <p>Delete all of the Gentran:Server database tables. Verify that the Gentran:Server program group was removed. Verify (in the Registry Editor) that the HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE\SOFTWARE\Sterling Commerce key was removed.</p> <p>Run Setup again and use the Create a new Gentran:Server system option, making sure that you provide the correct administrative database logon that has access to create database tables and grant permissions to those tables. <p>The Gentran:Server Executive Service fails to start remotely.</p>	<p>On the primary system controller, double-click Services in the Control Panel to access the Services dialog box. The automatic recovery will determine the point at which the install process failed and will resume installation from that point. InstallShield Error Messages

Introduction

While running the Setup program, if you receive an error that contains a return code, the error is an InstallShield error.

This section describes common InstallShield error messages. If you still have questions about an InstallShield error message, please contact Gentran:Server Customer Support.

Return code value table

The following table contains the InstallShield return codes, listed by return code value. This table describes the corresponding error message and, when possible, a suggested reason the error occurred.

Note

These messages were obtained from InstallShield. They may not be the most current version.

Return code value	Error message
-1	Unknown error.
-2	Unable to open input file.
-3	Unable to open output file. Suggested resolution Check the content of the target folder, file existence in target folder, and access privileges to target folder.
-4	Unable to write to file. Suggested resolution Check integrity of source and target disk. Make sure you selected the correct source disk.
-5	Input file not compressed with InstallShield Compressor. Suggested resolution Make sure that input is a compressed library created by the InstallShield Data Compression Program or an InstallShield function.
-6	Memory allocation error. Suggested resolution Internal error occurred. Reboot your system and try again.
-7	Header information of compressed file is incorrect. Suggested resolution Make sure file is compressed and not corrupted.

(Contd) Return code value	Error message
-8	Cannot decompress more than one compressed library. Suggested resolution Make sure that the input for decompression is not a wildcard.
-9	Source and target folders conflict. Suggested resolution Make sure that the target folder is not the same as the source folder.
-14	Specified input file is a wild card (not allowed in some APIs). Suggested resolution Make sure that the input is a specific file, not a wildcard.
-15	Specified output file is a wild card (not allowed in some APIs). Suggested resolution Make sure that the output is a specific file, not a wildcard.

-17	Internal pointer error.
-18	File size error.
-19	Linked list error.
-20	Output file not compressed with InstallShield Compressor. Suggested resolution Make sure that the output is a compressed library.
-21	File is compressed with an older compressor version. Suggested resolution Use a compatible InstallShield compressor.

-26	Incorrect data information.
