

Overview

- This module explains how to combine native and web pages on an iOS application.
- Use the WL.NativePage.show() API to open a native page from JavaScript™.
- With this method, you can send data from JavaScript to the opened native page and specify a callback to be called after the native page closed.

Web portion of the code (1 of 4)

Use the WL.NativePage.show() API to start a native page.

```
function openNativePage(){
    var params = {nameParam : $('#nameInput').val()};

Web portion of the code (4 of 4)

Use the WL.NativePage.show() API to start a native page.

```
function openNativePage(){
    var params = {nameParam : $('#nameInput').val()};
    WL.NativePage.show('HelloNative', backFromNativePage, params);
}

function backFromNativePage(data){
    alert("Received phone open is: " + data.phoneNumber);
}
```

After the native page finishes, it can pass data back to the web part of an application.





Create a native page (1 of 3)

Add a file to your Classes folder in Xcode.



Make sure to subclass the UIViewController.





Create a native page (2 of 3)

Important:

- If you work with existing ".m" and ".h" files, make sure to place these files in the Classes folder in the Xcode project.
- Placing these ".m" and ".h" files in the iphone\native\classes folder in Eclipse is not enough to have them referenced in the Xcode project.



Create a native page (3 of 3)

- Import NativePage.h to your class.
- You can retrieve custom data parameters that are passed from the web view by using the setDataFromWebView:(NSDictionary*)data method.

Returning control to the web view

- When the native page must switch back to the web view, a [NativePage showWebView:] method should be called.
- You can pass data back to the web view by using NSDictionary object.

Native code

```
-(IBAction)returnClicked:(id)sender{
    NSString *phone = [phoneNumber text];
    NSDictionary *returnedData = [NSDictionary dictionaryWithObject:phone forKey:@"phoneNumber"];
    [NativePage showWebView:returnedData];
}

JavaScript code

    alert("Received phone number is: " + data.phoneNumber);
}

Exercise

- Create an application that behaves as follows:
 - Opens a web page that contains a button.
 - When the button is clicked, a native page is displayed with text received from the web page.
 - The native page also contains a button.
 - When the native button is clicked, the native page is closed and the web page is displayed.
 - An alert that contains the text from the native page is displayed.
